

There were lots of predictions that the weather and water temps for Sunday would lead to the catch and release of the first white marlin of the year, and they were right! The "TUNAFOWL" based at Sunset Marina claimed the title for 2021 and some nice prize money for the honor! Capt. Corbin Ensor and the Harford County, MD crew of Brad Young, Luke Schmitt, Nick Prince and Dominic Marando were really looking for tuna, yellowfin actually. It was early morning in the Washington Canyon in 130 fathoms when the boys got a really hard hit on a Squidnation Flippy Floppy, and with the fish taking almost 500 yards of line, they were sure they had a bigeye on the line! Once Brad got it in sight, they knew they had the most likely first white but could not easily share the catch because their radio was broken! For this release the boat will receive a total of \$17,000 from a combination of sources supporting the offshore community! \$7,000 will come from Fisherman's United of Ocean City (Coastal Fisherman is a sponsor), \$5,000 from the Town of Ocean City as well as another \$5,000 from the Ocean City Marlin Club of which "TUNAFOWL" is a member.





This Week Last Year

- The first longfin tuna of the year was reported on June 9th by Evan Winterbottom on the "PYY Fishing" in the southern Poor Man's Canyon. The northern Baltimore was also a hot spot.
- The first wahoo of the season was reported by charter boat "Last Call". The 79 pound fish was caught in the Poor Man's Canyon
- Two new 'heaviest fish' reports for mako in both the Delaware and Maryland categories were made. The "Fine Line" reported a 330 lb. mako that took a bluefish in the Baltimore Canyon and Todd Middendorf caught a 330 lb. mako, also in the Baltimore Canyon as it was chasing a school of bigeye tuna.

The weather is still playing with us causing blow out days, especially on the weekends, and the last one was no exception putting most boats in the slips for Saturday. The good news however is that for those that could get out around the weather, the offshore action was strong and included the arrival of 3 'First Fish' reports to the Coastal Fisherman! As with last week, the southern Poor Man's Canyon was the hot spot with the northern Washington Canyon coming up next. Warmer waters up to the low 70's are being found so we expect the bite will continue working its way north.

The big news of the week was the catch and release of the first white marlin. Always a watershed moment for the White Marlin Capital of the World, this annual event creates competition and excitement as anglers reach for the title and associated prize money. As warmer water was being reported further north and the yellowfin tuna bite had turned on, many predicted that last Sunday after the blow the day before would be the day. Several captains even called out on social media that they would be the one creating some nice comments and rebuttals! has happened over the past few years, the first white was caught by anglers actually looking for tuna! Capt. Corbin Ensor on the "TUNAFOWL" took his crew to the Washington Canyon and set the spread for tuna in about 130 fathoms. The water was rough, but a little after 8:30AM they got a hard hit on a Flippy Floppy with the fish running out and taking almost 500 yards of line. The anglers shared with me that they thought they had a bigye on the line and were very excited! It was only after angler Brad Young got the white within eyesite did they know what they had. While I am sure catching the first white of the season is a title they will enjoy as well as the award monies, a small part of me thinks they would have liked a nice bigeye just as much!


Tuna would be the next highlight of the week, not because of a 'first fish', but because the yellowfins have arrived in quantity! It was Bill 'Squidnation' Pino that landed the first yellowfin back


on May 28th, but last week we saw them in mass. It started with Capt. Mark Hoos on the "Marli". He came to the dock last Friday with his limit of 18 yellowfin they caught behind the Rockpile. Capt. Jeremy Blunt had two back to back big yellowfin trips last Thursday and Friday coming into the Ocean City Fishing Center with 12 and 10 respectively, including a nice big 76 pounder on Friday. The "Pumpin' Hard" found 9 yellowfin and a bigeye at



the 800 Square. Sunday after the blow proved to be another great day with "Boss Hogg" finding 17 in the north Washington Canyon and the "Rhonda's Osprey" bringing back 8 from the Baltimore Canyon. All week was not roses however, as last Thursday proved to be very difficult for tuna with only a few lucky boats connecting that day.

We did see the first dolphin of the season arrive last Thursday! As with several 'First Fish' titles, this one took some time to figure out. Our reports actually started on Friday when we snapped a picture of the crew on the "Marli" which had a nice 19 lb. gaffer dolphin. After posting what we thought was the first Mahi, we got additional reports of two other catches on Thursday! Our policy allows for first fish reporting with 48 hours so some of this is to be expected. After reaching out to the captains, it was angler Michael Seicke on the "Second Chance" that garnered the title catching the first of 4 mahi that day at 9:15AM. Ivan Miller caught a bull dolphin on the "Top Hook" on Thursday inside the Poor Man's Canyon as well but did not have it weighed. While clearly the heaviest,





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current heaviest remains with the 19 pounder from the "Marli". All were caught in the open interestingly, with some hooked near floating debris jumping off during the fight.

Lastly for offshore, we saw the first two swordfish of the season. The first came in with the crew of the "Reel Chaos" with Capt. Anthony Matarese. They found a 176 lb. sword while deep dropping in the Poor Man's Canyon and the "Primary Search" with Capt. Austin Ensor raised theirs from 2000 feet in the Poor Man's as well.

All indications are that this next week should be good until the next weekend blow hits, currently expected on Saturday.

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OCEAN CITY FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

passed Several storms though the area this week, many very strong and dropping heavy rain. Low lying areas such as the lower part of Ocean City were flooded a couple different times this week. A strong west wind for the first part of the week kept tides low making some areas unpassable. The end of the week saw a ENE wind and also a rise in fish being caught.

Flounder

Flounder in the bay is in true summer mode. Most main channels when drifted with gulp or squid minnow combos will produce fish. With

the tourist arriving every day the pressure on the water has taken its toll and keepers are a little harder to come by. Resident anglers who target the lesser fished areas, behind Assateague Island or the northern part of the bay near the rt 90 bridge are still getting several nice flatties to take home. Ocean City bays have always been a place where most locals will use a squid and live minnow combo but Gulp will work. All the tackle shops are loaded up with live minnows and sell minnow drag buckets to keep them alive while fishing. The bay flounder boost saw a big increase

in anglers this week and also a rise in keeper fish. If you don't own a boat or have a friend that owns one, the bay boats are an inexpensive way to get out on the water and catch some fish. All the boats are family friendly and can even rent you the rod if you don't have one. I would recommend any of the boats we have listed here in the paper as I know most of the captains and all are very knowledgeable. On the near shore side, the ocean is also producing some nice flounder. The African Queen is seeing the best catches of flounder off the rubble piles and tire dumps. The low lying structure seems to be what the flounder want this week. Big Gulp dragged along the bottom on the down current size is producing the best results.


Sea Bass

Sea bass remains strong, however with this week's storms the catches were not as good as last week. Anchoring up on wrecks was the main method of getting onto a good catch. The drift and storms

www.coastalfisherman.net made drifting hard for many boats. Monty on the Morning Star reported he had a lot of limits this week even though the wind made it a little bumpy. Victor on the Ocean Princess reported his trips were met with some rough seas but when dual anchored on the wreck the fish eagerly came over the rail. Victor reports some nice flounder have come on board as well. Clam is the number one bait this week. The bass grounds saw some nice bass but not as consistent as the Queen.

Rockfish, Bluefish & Trout

As usual Big Bird Cropper was out with his Roy rigs catching some nice rockfish around the Rt.50 bridge. They caught rockfish up to 30 ". So it's a nice fillet for dinner tonight. He and Shaun also caught some big bluefish and a few weakfish up to 22". Morgan Mericle caught some monster rockfish at the bridge. He was on the bridge dropping bait down to the water right next to the bridge structure. Fish were all over slot but still a great catch. It is so good to see these big fish being caught this year. may not agree with the slot that is in place but the





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and more prominent this year after the slot has been in place for the past couple of years. Looking toward sharks, many have been caught from the surf. Both larger ones as well as dogfish are coming in on a regular basis. Most sharks are coming in after dark on cut bait rigged on a fish finder and big circle hook. I received a few reports of cobia being caught below Ocean City near the Virginia line. We have not seen the big numbers yet this year however with the warmer water it should coming blow up this Virginia Beach week. and northern islands are reporting record catches of both cobia as well as big red drum. Anglers report big pods of these fish along any structure in the near shore areas. Throwing eels and cut bait

rock seems to be stronger is the most common tactic used. Second method and my personal favorite is large swim jigs and top water plugs. The thrill of watching one of these big fish crush a top water plug is something every angler should experience.

Surf Fishing

This week was a little slow because of rough seas as well as dirty water from the storms.

Clams & Crabs

Clams remain strong in the Assateague Bays. Lots of large clams. Crabs in the northern bays are getting good with pots showing 6-10 keepers per pot. you find the snails in your traps you're in the right area.

Going Live

The Furuno Omni sonar and similar units have become commonplace in tournament sportfish boats. These systems produce long range live sonar images of the area around the boat while trolling for sportfish. Unlike a traditional sounder which shows a historical view of the water column under the boat, a Sonar like the Furuno Omni or Koden searchlight units show a live view of the horizontal area around the boat. These systems are used to locate bait or individual fish swimming nearby.

These sonar systems are costly and complex, prices can reach \$150,000 for a full installation. Space is also a consideration; these units require a large tube cut into the hull and space additional processing The results are hardware. captains amazing, and anglers can see and pursue close and distant swimming fish. While these systems not for every boat and budget, certainly this technology will evolve in the future, with smaller and less expensive systems predicted.

Good news for everyday anglers, there are a few small-scale sonar systems that produce a live sonar view, perfect for anglers looking to see the fish or bait around the boat. These systems were developed for the inland market, fishing on lakes and rivers. technology has caught on with coastal anglers too. One captain, Rick Stanczyk, fishing out of Islamorada, Florida uses a small-scale sonar system to target Tarpon in his fishing grounds. Many other saltwater anglers have adopted this technology to enhance their awareness of the water around the boat.

Garmin and Lowrance both make competitive live sonar products. Both brands offer systems consisting of a transducer and black box that connects to an existing Multifunctional display of the same brand. Not all hardware is compatible, so if researching a system like this be sure to check compatibility for all components. Both the Garmin and Lowrance systems are similarly priced, about \$1,500 for the basic package.

The most challenging part of these systems is the mounting method and www.coastalfisherman.net as a guided pole on the side of the boat that is lowered into the water and turned by hand to "see" other sectors around the boat. There are some third-party companies that offer pole mounts for these systems, such as summit fishing equipment. These transducers have a horizontal field of view of



location of the transducer on a saltwater fishing boat. As previously noted, these systems were designed for freshwater anglers and the transducers are often designed to mount to a trolling motor. This location gives the angler the ability to pivot the trolling motor and "see" a particular area with the live sonar. If you do not have a trolling motor, you could fabricate a mount, for example, Garmin (for demonstration purposes) has used a setup as simple about 20 degrees and a range approximately 100′ in salt water (farther in freshwater).

Garmin has a transom mount transducer for their live sonar, with this mount your "field of view" would be limited to the direction the boat is pointed and the boat would need to be turned to see a different sector of the water around the boat.

Besides the variety of the transducer mounting options, the rest of the system straight forward,



www.coastalfisherman.net usually the transducers connect to a small processor box that is networked to a compatible Multifunctional (MFD) display.

Garmin's product is named "Livescope" and is part of the Garmin Panoptic family of sonars. Garmin describes their product as: LiveScope Forward is an amazing tool for scouting and fishing out ahead of your cast. You are looking at live, incredibly detailed images of structure and fish swimming all around your boat - up to 200' in freshwater - even while your boat is stationary. Both LiveScope Forward and LiveScope Down modes are included in one transducer and are available with either transom or trolling motor mounts.

Lowrance's product is named ActiveTarget, Lowrance describes their product as: ActiveTarget allows you








to watch high-resolution images of fish movements, tracking them as they swim near your boat. When you see fish near structure and watch them respond to your lure, you will know if your current technique is working, or if it is time to make an adjustment—information that's harder to get from traditional sonar or structure imaging. Track fish and your presentation with

high-resolution views in front or below your boat or use the Scout mode to see an ultra-wide, overhead view of structure and fish activity in front of your boat, perfect for finding bait balls and big schools of fish.

Certainly not a substitute for the commercial Furuno and Koden type Sonar systems, the capabilities of the Livescope and ActiveTarget systems are another tool for everyday anglers to learn about the fish and structure around the boat, it is a great compliment to a traditional a sounder and learned fishing techniques, providing additional situation awareness for anglers fishing in freshwater back bays and even coastal waters.

Ginger Garlic Pan Roasted Swordfish

Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons butter room temperature
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley
- 1 clove garlic minced
- ½ teaspoon ginger grated
- 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- ½ teaspoon lemon peel grated
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 12 ounces swordfish fillets should be 6-7 ounces each

Sea salt to taste

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400°F.

In a small bowl blend together the butter, parsley, garlic, ginger, red pepper and lemon peel.



Season the swordfish to taste with sea salt.

Place an ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat and when hot add one tablespoon of olive oil and the swordfish, salted side down.

Pan sear the swordfish for 1-2 minutes or until it has a nice color.

Turn the swordfish over, and drain out any excess oil from the pan. Carefully add a few tablespoons of water to the pan and place the pan in a preheated 400 degree oven

Roast the swordfish until just cooked through, about 6-8 minutes or until desired doneness.

Transfer swordfish to a serving dish

Add seasoned butter mixture to the same skillet. Allow it to cook slightly over medium-high heat until melted and bubbling (1-2 minutes).

Pour butter sauce over swordfish and serve with your favorite side dishes.

Tuna Steaks with Lemon-Parsley Butter

Ingredients:

- 3 tuna steaks
- 3 tablespoons butter (unsalted, softened)
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons parsley (dry)
- 1 ½ tablespoon olive oil
- 2 teaspoons black pepper (ground)

Salt to taste



Directions:

In a small bowl, combine butter, lemon juice and parsley. Form a butter ball.

Wash tuna steaks and pat dry with paper towels. Season with salt on all sides. Put black pepper on a small plate. Coat tuna sides with black pepper, gently pressing it in.

Heat oil in a thick-bottomed frying pan over medium-high heat. Sear tuna steaks for about 2 minutes per side or until the desired doneness is reached. Turn off the heat and add butter mixture.

Grilled Mahi in Lemon Butter Sauce

Ingredients:



6 (5-6 ounce) mahi fillets

Salt to taste

- 2 Tbsp. Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 6 Tbsp. Butter
- 1/4 Onion (minced)
- ½ tsp. Garlic (minced)
- 1/4 cup Chicken Stock
- 2 Lemons

Directions:

Preheat a grill to medium/high heat.

Place the mahi fillets in a bowl and sprinkle salt and pepper over the top of the fish, to taste.

Drizzle the olive oil over the fish and turn the fish to coat.

Place the fish on the hot grill and let cook for about 3-4 minutes per side (depending on thickness), turning carefully. You will know it is done when it flakes easily with a fork.

Remove from the grill to a serving dish.

While the fish is cooking, melt 1 tablespoon of the butter over medium/high heat in a small saute pan.

Add the minced onion to the butter and saute for about 2 minutes, or until softened.

Add garlic and saute for an additional 30 seconds.

Add the chicken stock to the pan and let simmer until reduced by half.

Add the lemon juice and cook for 2 more minutes.

Remove the pan from the heat.

Add the remaining butter, 1 tablespoon at a time, to the sauce and stir in until the sauce thickens and becomes glossy.



Pour butter sauce over the top of the mahi mahi and serve.

Flounder With Brown Butter, Lemon and Tarragon

Ingredients:

1 cup all-purpose flour

Salt and pepper

Pinch of cayenne

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 flounder fillets of equal size, 6 to 8 oz. each
- 3 tablespoons cold unsalted butter, cut into chunks
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Directions:

Put flour in a low bowl or pie plate and stir in a generous amount of salt and pepper and

Place a large cast-iron skillet



over medium-high heat. Add olive oil and tilt pan to coat bottom.

Season the fillets lightly with salt and pepper. Dip each fillet quickly into flour mixture, shaking off excess flour.

Lay fillets in skillet in one layer. Cook for about 2 minutes per side, until golden. Transfer cooked fish to a warm platter.



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The great thing about fishing is that it can be very easy and very local. Grant Taylor from Severn, MD was vacationing with his grandfather when he tossed a line in a neighborhood community pond with a plastic lizard lure and tricked this nice 2 lb. large mouth bass.

In large pot over high heat, bring 4 quarts of water and 2 tablespoons of kosher salt to a boil. Add the linguine and cook according to the package directions until just shy of al dente (the pasta should still be firm to the bite since it will cook another minute or two in the sauce).

Meanwhile, in a very large sauté pan over medium-high heat, heat the olive oil until hot but not smoking. Add the shallots and garlic and sauté until just golden, about 30 seconds. Add the wine, red pepper flakes, 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt, clams, and 1/4 cup of the parsley; bring to a simmer and cook, covered, until the clams open, 6 to 8 minutes. Discard any unopened clams.

Reserving 1/2 cup of the cooking water, drain the linguine in a colander (do not rinse). Add the pasta to the sauté pan with the clams. (If you don't have room for everything in one pan, transfer the clams to a plate and cover to keep warm. When ready to serve, add them back to the pasta on a serving platter). Increase the heat to medium and cook the linguini with the clams, tossing occasionally, until the pasta absorbs most of the sauce and is just tender, 1 to 2 minutes. If necessary, add

www.coastalfisherman.net some of reserved cooking water to keep moist. Remove the pan from the heat. Add the butter, lemon zest, lemon juice, and the remaining 2 tablespoons of parsley; toss to coat. Taste and adjust the seasoning with more salt, lemon zest and/or lemon juice, if necessary. Transfer to a serving dish or bowls and serve.

Note: When cooking with wine, select a bottle that is inexpensive (under \$10) but still good enough to drink. Avoid "cooking wines," which are salty and include additives.

Larry B's Velvety Smooth Manhattan Cocktail

Ingredients:

Ice, for stirring

3-4 ounces of fine bourbon (Rye is both unacceptable & insulting!)

1 ounce sweet vermouth

1 spoonful of Maraschino cherry juice

must start their day by "where are the fish?" Of course the answer to that question will set the stage for the day and dictate where the angler will first point their boat, or elect to set up on a pier, beach, bridge, or bank. If they get it right, anglers have a shot at a good catch. If they get it wrong there's a chance that the only life they'll encounter that day will be seagulls and seaweed!

For offshore anglers, the answer to where the fish are will typically include a pretty big geographical area such as the Baltimore Canyon, the Hotdog, or the Jack Spot and then they run out and work those places until they either find the fish or don't. But inshore fishermen will likely choose a much more "precise" place to

No matter where, or for spend their time, like the what type of fish they'll Rt 50 Bridge, the south be chasing, every angler jetty, the Thorofare, the Rt. 90 Bridge and so forth. answering the question During the season all of these places will have at least some fish in them at all times, but unlike an offshore guy who trolls around a general area where he hopes the fish will be, inshore fishermen must often figure out precisely where the fish are so that they can present their baits or lures within a few feet or sometimes a few inches of what they are trying to catch. Are the fish behind or in front of that piling? Are they on the west or east side of the bridge support? Are they at the tip of the jetty or on the north or south side? A little knowledge about what prompts certain species to hang-out in one place over another can help inshore anglers zero in on exactly where they need to put their bait or lure to catch a fish.

inshore fishing is knowing the layout of the bottom, drop-offs, where the ledges, obstructions, and shoals are located, as well as the composition of the bottom which might be sand, soft mud, grass, or clay. These environmental types of fish might be found in what areas, with some of the most sought after by anglers being the fish often known as "ambush predators."



The yellowfin tuna is among the larger tuna species, reaching weights over 400 pounds, off Cabo San Lucas, Mexico in September 2012. but is significantly smaller than the Atlantic and Pacific bluefin tunas, which can reach over 990 pounds, and slightly smaller than the bigeye tuna and the southern bluefin tuna.

- The second dorsal fin and the anal fin, as well as the finlets between those fins and the tail, are bright yellow, giving this fish its common name. The second dorsal and anal fins can be very long in mature specimens, reaching almost as far back as the tail and giving the appearance of sickles. The pectoral fins are also longer than the bluefin tuna, but not as long as those of the longfin albacore. The main body is a very dark metallic blue, changing to silver on the belly, which has about 20 vertical lines.
- Yellowfin tuna are epipelagic fish that inhabit the mixed surface layer of the ocean above the thermocline in 65 to 88-degree water. Sonic tracking has found that although yellowfin tuna, unlike the related bigeye tuna, mostly range in the top 330 ft. of the water column and penetrate the thermocline relatively infrequently, they are capable of diving to considerable depths. An individual fish tagged in the Indian Ocean with an archival tag spent 85% of its time in depths shallower than 246 ft., but was recorded making dives to
 - Yellowfin tuna often travel in schools with similarly sized companions. They sometimes school with other tuna species and mixed schools of smaller yellowfin and skipjack tuna. They are often associated with various species of dolphins or porpoises, as well as with larger marine creatures such as whales and whale 3,810 ft. sharks. They also associate with drifting flotsam such as logs and pallets, and sonic tagging indicates some

Spawning occurs throughout the year with the peak during summer months. They typically reach weights of follow moving vessels

 Yellowfin tuna prey include other fish, pelagic crustaceans and squid. Like all tunas, their body shape is particularly adapted for speed, enabling them to pursue and capture fast-moving baitfish such as flying fish, slightly over 8 lbs. after only 18 months. sauries, and mackerel. Schooling species such as myctophids or lanternfish and similar pelagic driftfish, anchovies, and sardines are frequently taken. Large yellowfins prey on smaller members of the tuna family such as frigate mackerel and skipjack tuna. In turn, yellowfin are preyed upon when they are young by other pelagic hunters, including larger tuna, seabirds and predatory fish such as wahoo, shark and billfish. Adults are threatened only by the largest and fastest hunters, such as toothed whales, particularly the false killer whale, pelagic sharks such as the mako and great white shark, large Atlantic blue marlin, Pacific blue marlin and black marlin. The main source of mortality, however, is industrial tuna fisheries.

Yellowfins are able to escape most predators, because unlike most fish, tuna are warm-blooded and their warm muscles make them extremely strong swimmers, with speeds of up to 50 miles per hour. They can navigate enormous distances, sometimes crossing entire oceans.

Yellowfin tuna have a typical lifespan of 8 years.


Sea Bass

They also stated that have received a lot more reports of more trout being caught than bluefish. So the question is, where are the big bluefish? As for sea trout, Ron Beatty of Delmar caught a nice 3.6 lb. weakfish while fishing Indian River this week. The fish was caught on sand fleas and weighed in at Hook'em and Cook'em Tackle. received reports that sea trout and weakfish were also caught up by the power plant. For those of you who don't live in the back area of the bay and didn't hear the deafening boom at 8 am Saturday, the power plant



www.coastalfisherman.net towers and structure were imploded. If you are one that fishes the back channel of the power plant be aware of this as some debris may have fallen into the water. The water will also be dirty for a few days I'm sure with the clean up going on. Sea trout are fun and can be targeted by any shallow greasy area using a light simbait such as a paddle tail. Early morning or late evening is the best time to go.

Surf Report

A few spots and shad are still in the surf, but kingfish remain the big targeted fish. Blood worms or fish bites are the best bait. Areas up north towards the point look to be the most productive. A few smaller bluefish are being caught but not in the numbers we saw in previous years. Mullet rigs and dual float rigs are the best when targeting bluefish. Whole finger mullet or cut baits should be used. The storms we had this week should stir up the surf and will hopefully bring in some more fish this coming week.

Clams & Crabs

Crabs have really gotten good lately. Catches of 10-13 keepers per pot were the average for this week. I saw several very small juvenile crabs coming in the pots this week, a great sign that the spawn was a good one this spring. Clamming is also in full swing with Rehoboth Bay and Holt's Landing being the top spot to rake. Until next week...




