

It's no secret that flounder fishing on ocean reefs and wrecks has been spectacular this season, both in quantity and quality of fish being caught. Kenny Dodson of Ocean View, DE followed up the 8 lb. 4 oz. flounder he boated earlier this month with this 8 lb. 8 oz. flattie muscled in while fishing on the head boat, "Angler" with Capt. Chris Mizurak and mate Dean Lo. The 26 3/4-inch fish was caught on a skirted rig tipped with flounder belly at the Old Grounds. The flounder was 1 of 2 caught by Kenny during the trip. The "Angler" is docked at Capt. Bill Bunting's Angler Dock in Ocean City, MD.



Jack Conway, Sr. of New York, NY, George Merrick of Dagsboro, DE, Josh Gessler of Media, PA, Jack Conway, Jr. of New York, NY, Jacob Webb of Lewes, DE and Tommy Gessler of Media, PA boated 2 bigeyes and 9 yellowfin while fishing in the Washington Canyon just before dark. They then headed down to the Poor Man's Canyon where they picked up a longfin albacore and 4 white marlin releases. The bigeyes weighed 185 and 236 lbs. on the scale at Hook'em & Cook'em.





Ocean City Fishing Report

- by Larry Jock



Although this is the last issue of the *Coastal Fisherman* for the season, the fishing action around Ocean City and out in the canyons is far from over.

Flounder

It was a good week for flounder fishing, especially if you ventured out to ocean structure. The Old Grounds, in particular, produced some fantastic catches of flatties for anglers who wanted to make the 16 mile run.

Pat Hurley's anglers on the "Slack Grabber" had multiple days at the Old Grounds where they returned with their limit of flounder weighing up to 4 lbs. I spoke to Pat on Sunday and he said that rigs with silver blades and red hooks were definitely the hot set-up. When it comes to bait, nothing has been outproducing flounder and mahi belly. Anglers have been able to catch fish with Gulp! Swimming Mullets or scented Z-Man baits, but bellies were the primo bait to nab sizable flounder.

The largest flounder landed this week was Kenny Dodson's 8 lb. 8 oz. flattie caught at the Old Grounds. Several other fish over 5 lbs. were caught throughout the week, including Mike Kinder's 6 pounder caught at an artificial reef while mating on the "Morning Star".

In the bay, flounder fishing

wasn't bad and some big ones were caught, primarily by anglers drifting in the East Channel like Chad Tate's 25-inch, 6 lb. flattie caught on a 4-inch, chartreuse Gulp! near Bird Island. Other anglers were able to land big ones fishing both north and south of the Rt. 50 Bridge. Although the East Channel is a popular spot, don't forget to work the edges of the West Channel as well, especially south of the Rt. 50 Bridge. Also keep in mind that these fish are still staging for their migration to ocean structure, so look for those holes along the north wall of the inlet and around the South Jetty.

Bluefish

Snapper bluefish have been in

the surf for a couple of weeks now, and you can also find them around the pilings of the Rt. 50 Bridge. The big news last week was the 18 lb. chopper caught by Kevin Weber around the Rt. 50 Bridge. Kevin weighed the bluefish on the scale at Bahia Marina, but unfortunately nobody snapped a picture, so we won't be able to see what that monster looked like.

Croaker

Croakers continue to be caught by anglers drifting in the Ocean City Inlet, with stray fish being found in the West Channel as well. Fishbites or Gulp! artificial baits are perfect for these hardheads.

Red Drum

Anglers fishing around the pilings of the Rt. 50 Bridge are still hooking up with both red and black drum. Most of the drum are in the 20 to 24-inch range with fish being caught on sand fleas and cut bait.

Marlin

We saw quite a few marlin

flags flying from boats returning from canyons south of the inlet last week. Although most of our local boats found good results over the weekend in the Washington Canyon and at the Rockpile, the better bite, at least on Sunday, was down in the Norfolk Canyon.

In the middle of the week, we saw white marlin released in the Baltimore Canyon, where the "Sea Slammer" released 6 and the "Billfisher" released 7. Saturday, the "Billfisher" moved to the Rockpile and racked up 13 white marlin releases. Sunday saw numerous local billfish boats head south with releases at the Rockpile by the "Grande Pez" (6), "Reel Joy" (5) and the "Billfisher" (3). The "Odinspear" released 4 white marlin at the Washington Canyon where the "Keep Er Wet" returned earlier from an overnighter with a blue marlin release, estimated at 250 lbs. Early in the week, the "Marli" also recorded a blue marlin release in the Washington Canyon, with theirs estimated at 400 lbs.

Tuna

Although yellowfin tuna dominated the action for the week, we also saw quite a few bigeye tuna show up at the scale as well. All of the tuna action centered in the Washington Canyon where boats continued to spot whales in their tuna hole.

The "Restless Lady" had a heckuva week for both bigeyes and yellowfins. On Tuesday, they returned from an overnight trip with 3 bigeyes and their limit of yellowfins. On Wednesday, they added another 3 bigeyes to the tally along with 24 more yellowfins, and on Monday, they came back from an overnight trip with yellowfins and a 72-inch, 248 lb. bigeye. Quite a week!

A couple of other notable bigeye catches last week were the "Playmate" with 4 eyeballs on

Thursday in the Washington Canyon, the "No Quarter", who returned on Monday with their 20th bigeye of the season and the "Chain Reaction" who boated a 246 pounder on Sunday while trolling in the Washington.

Last week, boat after boat returned to the dock with their limit of yellowfin tuna. Although the vast majority were caught while chunking, a few were caught on the troll as well. The best bite seemed to occur between noon and 3:00 PM and then again right before dark. Several captains reported the fish being thick and coming right up to the back of the boat, providing anglers with quite a show. The "Marli", "That's Right", "Fugitive", "Playmate", "No Quarter", "Restless Lady" and "Reel Chaos" all had days with over 20 vellowfins in the box (sorry if I missed anyone). Amazingly enough, not only did most boats return with their limit of vellowfins, but many released as many as 50 more during their trip. If you want to get in on the action, NOW is the time to book a local charter boat.

Wahoo

A couple of wahoo were caught last week. On Wednesday, the "Reel Attitude" boxed a 65 pounder in 50 fathoms in the Baltimore Canyon and on Sunday, "The Stacey" brought one back from the Poor Man's Canyon.







Driftin' Easy

-by Sue Foster



It's the last *Coastal Fisherman* of the season! What was this year like? What are anglers saying?

Like always, I've had customers say it was the worst year they've ever had, while others say it was great!

It was a slow start and a chilly spring. I know our business was pretty quiet this spring and so were others. We were happy to have a 16-inch flounder size and figured we'd really mug up on keeper flounder this summer. We even spent time worrying what would happen if we overcaught our quota by the middle of the summer. Well, we didn't have to worry about that!

Once flounder started biting in the bay, we had a pretty fair year of catching them, but nothing like we expected. We had some really good days fishing in the bay, some so-so days, and some terrible days. Averaging it all out, I'd say it was an OK bay flounder season but nothing spectacular. With a 16-inch size limit, we should have been limiting out every day!

Some people thought that a certain percentage of flounder stayed offshore because of the cold spring and never came into the bay. That's making sense now, because suddenly flounder catches have been fantastic offshore on artificial reef sites. The further offshore, the larger the fish. Ocean-going party boats have been really

happy about that because offshore sea bass fishing got slow towards the end of the summer, and the croaker run has not been what we'd like to see.

Speaking of croaker, usually we have a nice run of them in the bay towards the end of July that lasts into the mid-to-third week of August. This didn't happen this year. Occasionally anglers would get into some croaker, but they were running really small. We had some action out at Russell's Reef towards the end of the season, so maybe they'll turn on yet. I think it's too late to turn on in the bay though... but maybe.

A lot of the local anglers living around the Route 54 Bridge had a surprise summer of catching big croaker and puppy drum right out their back door! Anglers were weighing in puppy drum all summer from those areas up there. Last week, we started seeing some of these puppy drum catches around the pilings of the Rt. 50 Bridge. prediction is that it will be a good fall for catching puppy drum along with a mix of black drum from the Rt. 50 Bridge, Inlet, Oceanic Pier, Ocean Pier, and from the surf. Last fall, we had a really good drum run in the surf in October and November.

Speaking of the surf, we had one of the best years I ever remember in history of kingfish catches. (That's Northern and

Southern Whiting!) We've been in business since 1980 and I have never sold so many bloodworms and Fishbite bloodworms in a single summer. Anglers that had never caught a fish in the surf could easily catch kingfish Bluefish were Norfolk spot. almost non-existent and the only things big in the surf were sharks and skates. If anglers were happy catching small pan fish, they were happy, happy, happy!

Our striper run in the surf this year was not what it was in the past. Usually we have a good run in May. It was only fair, probably because of the weather. Hopefully we'll have a good run this fall. Anglers last week had some surprise catches of early stripers from the surf in Fenwick Island and Inlet fishermen said they saw schools of small stripers breaking the surface in the inlet. That's a good sign.

We did have an excellent black drum run on Assateague this spring! Anglers were using orange Fishbites and sand fleas. Hopefully we'll see some more of them this fall.

Bluefish started biting in the surf the first week of September.

They were also chomping at Gotcha Plugs tossed from the Route 50 Bridge. Let's hope they stick around and give anglers some action in the surf and from the piers. summer itself was slow on bluefish from the Rt. 50 Bridge at night. Usually, we can't keep Gotcha Plugs on the shelf, and besides a few weeks in the early summer, the bluefish action was quiet. The Gotcha Plugs were getting dusty along with the big swimming shad lures for stripers. Night action was mostly small to medium-sized sea trout (weakfish) and shad with a few schoolie stripers mixed in. We sold a lot of Spec

Speaking of trout, they seem to be coming back. We had a lot of reports from the Oceanic Pier all summer long that the trout were biting. Towards the end of the summer, some good-sized ones were being caught. Since anglers can only keep one, it's more of a "sport" than a fish fry. Delaware anglers saw quite a few as well. I caught half dozen small ones from the Ocean Pier last week and an angler called me up to say he caught some in the surf.

Spot! We had some big spot

in the bay and surf this year. Eating-sized spot! Many anglers were disappointed that the spot were not small enough for flounder fishing. With fall coming up, they'll be just fine for striper fishing!

A lot of youngsters were happy with the spot, small croakers and other panfish such as ocean perch and small flounder that were caught from the Northside Park at 125th Street. Many a child caught their first fish up there. Crabbing was decent in that area also until about mid-August when it slowed down. Usually crabbing picks back up in mid-September until October when the crabs start migrating.

Speaking of Northside Park, it's a free fishing zone so anglers fishing there with their children did not have to buy a fishing license. So is the 2nd through 4th Street Bulkhead along with the Oceanic Pier and the Ocean Pier. Ocean City is blessed to have these four areas where anglers do not have to buy a license. As long as the two pay piers are manned, they are free zones. (You do have to pay to get on the piers.) A lot of vacationers that want to "try" fishing frequent these areas.

As anticipated, we had a tremendous flow of vacationers from New Jersey and New York this year that were here for the first time. Many of the beaches up north were still damaged by Hurricane Sandy and many anglers and vacationers came to Ocean City, MD for the first time. I'd like to thank the Town Of Ocean City for promoting our area. They did a great job and we stayed busy all summer once the weather straightened out.

Speaking of thanking people, I'd like to thank Larry Jock for putting out the best fishing newspaper ever. I'd like to thank all my readers and all my customers for patronizing our stores. I'd especially like to thank all my employees who worked especially hard this busy season.

HUNT SEA DUCKS ON THE DELAWARE BAY

Delaware Family Fishing is now offering sea duck hunting on the Delaware Bay and Atlantic Ocean. Hunt Scoters (common, surf, whitewing) and Longtail (Old Squaw) ducks from the LIL' ANGLER II. Season runs September 24th until January 25th with a bag limit of 7 (scoters, longtail, eider) with no more than 4 scoters. Two hunting options are available.

- 1. Standard sea duck hunt is 6 hours. Cost of the hunt is \$125 per gun with a 4 gun minimum. LIL' ANGLER II can and will accommodate more than 6 hunters, call Capt. Brian (302-430-3414) for more details. Hunting license, stamps, gun and ammunition are NOT included.
- 2. Combo hunting and fishing is a 10 hours. This will be a half fishing/half hunting trip, with your choice of either striped bass or tautog as the target species of fish. Cost of the trip is \$900 for up to 4 people and \$150 per person over 4 to a maximum of 6 people. LIL' ANGLER II can and will accommodate more than 6 hunters, call Capt. Brian (302-430-3414) for more details. Hunting license, stamps, gun and ammunition are NOT included.

THE FOLLOWING POLICIES APPLY TO ALL CHARTERS INVOLVING HUNTING: No alcohol permitted on any hunting trips.

Hunters must provide their own Delaware state hunting license, Delaware state waterfowl stamp, federal waterfowl stamp, and Delaware HIP number. Lewes Harbour Marina (302-645-2277) is a Delaware state licensing agent. Federal waterfowl stamp may be purchased from the US Post Office. A 3 day non-resident hunting license valid for small game and waterfowl \$50, Delaware state waterfowl stamp \$9. Hunters born after January 1st, 1967 must have a valid hunter safety education certificate.

*Ammunition non-toxic size 3 or larger (we recommend a minimum of

50 rounds), and gun (no guns under 20 gauge)

Hunters must provide the following information to the guide as required by Delaware state law:
Name, address, hunting license number, Delaware HIP number

- All state and federal laws are observed
 All birds will be tagged with hunter's information
- Hunters must take all harvested birds with them
- Unsafe hunting practices will result in the hunt ending early with no refund









Flounder are staging up to make their migration to ocean structure, bluefish are starting to show up better numbers, drum continue to attack live bait and lures in the inlets and yellowfin action in the Washington Canyon has really turned on. Marlin have been hit or miss, with the better bite showing up all the way down in the Norfolk Canyon this past weekend. Now all we need is an early arrival for stripers and everyone will be



happy.

Joe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina reported that the local fishing community lost a well respected friend last week with the passing of Joe Walker. Joe said, "Joe Walker was a regular at the dock every summer, in pursuit of his passion, catching flounder. Through many years of

The ocean flounder bite continued to be good when the wind let up enough for boats to make it out. Flatfish have been staging on structure of the Old Grounds, and along the channel edges between "DB" Buoy and the Delaware Light. Captain Brent's flukers aboard the charter boat, "Katydid" endured rough seas on Thursday, but were rewarded with 26 quality keeper flatties. Many of them weighed between 5 and 6 pounds. The weather broke Sunday and it looked as busy as Times Square on the flounder grounds, with many boats out to take advantage of the promising conditions. Mike Newsham, Mason Newsham, Geoff Klopp and Frank Stiles limited out with 16 real pretty fish by lunch time on Sunday aboard the "Local Girl". Five of the fluke were over 5 pounds and Mason managed a 7.4 pound citation doormat. Doug Mickowski muscled in a magnum 8.25 pound flatfish while drifting squid and smelt near "DB" as well. Captain Carey's Sunday group harvested 20 keeper flounder aboard "Grizzly" at the Old Grounds.

In the Delaware Bay, keeper fluke were harder to come by. However, some were intercepted around structure as they made their move out of the Delaware

back in July of 2006 that was

Bay. Shea Lindale and Nate Evans deployed live spot near the Inner Wall on Wednesday to capture their limit of eight plump flounder.

Panfish remain plentiful in the Bay, with an assortment of croakers, kingfish, blowfish, trout, triggerfish, porgies, spot bluefish. The best concentrations of bottomfish occurred on the Star Site and The Shears, and also between Reefs 6 and 7 and The Lower Middle. Captain Vince on the "Miss Kirstin" found blues feeding under diving gulls at Brown Shoal on Saturday and his guys put 32 in the box.

Size of the croakers has improved, with a few reaching "Cadillac" proportions. The "Angler" headboat had hardheads up to 17-inches on a couple trips and most patrons took home keeper trout Sunday.

Spot have been big this season too, and some real beauties were taken in the Lewes Canal and Broadkill River with bloodworms and Fishbites. Folks at Cape Henlopen Pier got in on the hot spot action too. Clyde Gardner caught 75 slab siders

from the Pier on Tuesday and 72 more on Wednesday.


Pompano were reported from the Pier over the weekend. Surfcasters at the point of Cape Henlopen caught snapper blues with cut fresh mullet.

On the offshore scene, chunkers were still finding good numbers of tuna in the Washington Canyon. Crews tossing butterfish and utilizing light fluorocarbon leaders caught limits of yellowfins among whales in 200 fathoms during the daylight. Greg, Chris and Nicholas Wagner teamed up for 8 yellowfins in 500 fathoms of the Washington on Wednesday night. Trollers working among pods of whales the last hours of daylight or at dawn in the Washington and Wilmington Canyons hooked bigeyes. It's been one of the best "eyeball" seasons many offshore anglers remember.

Billfish, wahoo and sharks were also reported by crews trolling the Canyons. Captain Mike Faust and the boys on "Chasin' Tail" released a pair of whites trolling between the Poor Man's and Washington Canyons, and Jimmy Yingling bested a 133

pound make on that same excursion. Mike Trestka took a mako on Sunday in the Poor Man's aboard the charter boat, Lil' Angler II. Also on Sunday, Hank Draper and his buddies worked 76-degree water in 70 fathoms around the 090 line of the Poor Man's where they released a 108-inch blue marlin, estimated at over 400 pounds. In addition, they boated four longfins in the 35 to 40 pound class, plus 5 gaffer dolphin. Ed Sigda and the guys aboard the "Snow Goose" trolled the Baltimore Canyon on Sunday for three chunky true albacore, then dropped for a nice batch of blueline tilefish.

Since this is the final column of the season, I want to take this opportunity to thank Bert Adams, Joe Morris, Pockets Baker and Bruce McGuigan for their contributions to this report throughout the year. Also, a big thank you to all the tackle shops for sending us some fantastic pictures of catches made by Delaware anglers this season. It was a great year and all of us at the Coastal Fisherman wish everyone a happy, successful and safe rest of the fishing season.







Ship to Shore

BE PREPARED

It hardly seems possible, but another season is slipping away from us and cold weather will be here before we know it. While some boaters will start to get ready to head south to Florida, it bears repeating that the Eastern Shore enjoys some really great fishing and perfect weather for quite a while into the fall.

Sooner or later, however, it will be time for the local boaters to put their vessels away for 2013. If you didn't have occasion to purchase new equipment this year and you are not taking your boat south, this is not the time to buy anything. You will lose valuable months of warranty. However, it is time to access what you have and take some precautions to protect your equipment over the winter.

Many of you shrink wrap your boat for the winter and that is an excellent way to protect everything but your electronic equipment. The shrink wrapping traps moisture and temperature variations, particularly if it is in direct sunlight, can create some real corrosion problems. It is best, whenever possible, to remove all of the equipment displays you can and store them in a cool, dry place. Be sure to clean them up first or take them to an electronics shop to do it for you.

Hopefully you remembered not to clean your LCD display screen(s) with anything other than a microfiber cloth. Even doing that, they can still get pretty grungy. One product came out this year made especially for cleaning LCD screens and I really like it. CRC VisiclearTM Display Cleaner is an aerosol spray foam that CRC says can be applied directly to your LCD screen and then wiped off with that microfiber cloth. I have tried it and it works well. The foam does not run down but stays right where you sprayed it. It can be used not only on your marine equipment but also on your computer screens and LCD television sets. You can find more information on this product and other items for marine use at web their site. www.crcindustries.com.

As we look towards the next season, it's usually pretty predictable insofar as what items will be likely to come along, but recent years have not followed that pattern. The generally, sluggish economy has had an impact on many manufacturers and it does not appear that a great deal of money is being put into research and development. One thing we can expect is the continuing expansion of the use of touch screens and wireless communications between your marine equipment and other personal items such Smartphones and tablets. Flexibility and the ability to add items to your marine electronics package as you go along seems to be the trend. For example, if you looking into a new GPS/plotter, check to see what else can be added to it. Can you add radar by just purchasing a

top unit scanner or radome? Can you add weather fax or sound systems? Make plans for next year.

So what can we expect for 2014? At one time, boaters were reluctant to use one display for multiple uses for fear of losing everything if the display went out, but these units have proven to be very reliable, so now folks are looking for the maximum in integration of multiple items. It will be interesting to see if Airmar comes out with CHIRP technology transducers in

smaller, transom-mounted transducers. That will open up the superior detailing of fish finders to more and more boaters. I'll be looking with great interest to see what comes along. I know that late January and early February will be the benchmark dates for whatever is new for 2014. I wish you all a safe and healthy winter.



Chum Lines

As a kid first learning about fishing Ocean City's inshore waters, I was always attracted to finding and fishing the deepest parts of the bay. I remember that there were a couple "holes" in particular that dropped from 6-feet to 15-feet in depth that I was always certain would hold the biggest flounder in the bay. After all, it only made sense that the biggest fish would prefer the deepest water from which to both hide from fishermen and ambush their prey. Rarely seeing anyone else fishing these locations, I just knew I'd found a couple little honey-holes that would be my own secret places for big flounder. The problem was, no matter how or when I fished these deep-water haunts I never caught any big flounder. In fact, when I think back about it now I don't recall ever catching even a single fish of any size or type in either of my "secret holes." Never quite understanding why those places didn't produce, I eventually gave up on them and resigned myself to fishing among the rest of the bayfishermen in the channels and along the edges of the shoals.

It's interesting how things sometimes turn around. Over the last decades or so, I've spent a fair amount time in the winter chasing fish across the shallowwater flats of the Florida Keys, and one thing I learned down there is that there are a lot of very big fish on this planet that

have no problem hanging out in very shallow water. Bringing this knowledge home to Delmarva I've made it a mission to fish and explore not the deepest parts of the bay waters but some of the shallowest, and over time I've come to know that even though the species are different, a lot of the same kind of skinny-water fishing fun that goes on in south Florida is available to anglers here in our local bays. Flats-fishing on Delmarva? Well, as a matter of fact - ves!

While a lot of local anglers might consider the idea of fishing in 1-3 feet of water not only a bit bizarre but also a total waste of time, let's start by mulling over one obvious point - where are most of the baitfish and other little critters in the bay typically found? Minnows, shiners, mullet, spot, shrimp, mussels, clams, snails, and crabs all poke around the shallow, marshy areas, and you'll find that just about all year such places are almost always loaded up with enough food to keep just about any size fish fat and

What often goes on in these shallow areas is when the tide drops all the way down, the predator fish are forced to move out of the shallowest water up close to banks that might drop down to a depth of foot or less. At the extreme low tide, baitfish can find some sanctuary in the very shallow water as the bigger

fish are pushed out and hold in the 2 to 4-foot zone. Then as the tide begins to rise the predators can be eager to move up with the water and get their shots at food that was previously unreachable.

In the same way that someone will stay out of trouble if they beach their boat when the tide is rising rather than when it's falling, fish don't want to get stranded in the shallows either and so are very sensitive to the movement of the tides and will tend to be more bold about moving into very shallow water when the tide is rising than when it is falling. Therefore, fish that might be found in 1 to 2-feet on a rising tide might move out to 2 to 3feet as just as soon as the tide starts to fall. They're still in what most would consider "shallow-water," just not as shallow as when the tide is rising.

Therefore, anglers who fish the shallows should concentrate on the shallowest water on the rising tide and move out a bit when it's falling. Keep in mind that fish will often move to the mouths of little creeks and cuts to nab baitfish being washed out with the receding water. On extreme high tides, fish will take advantage of the extra water and often push into places anglers might never expect them to be, like actually "among" the marsh grass, or way up a mosquito ditch.


While fishing the shallows, one must remember that when fish don't have much water over their head they tend to be on high alert for both prey and the danger, so they tend to be spooky and require a stealthy

approach by anglers. This means no banging and clanging on the boat or loud talking, and also requires that boat motors be shut down a hundred yards or so from the fishing location and then poled, paddled, drifted or electric-motored to within casting range.

Once on the scene, anglers can cast whatever bait, lures, jigs or flies they think will be most appropriate for the species they anticipate will be there. Of course, because it's so shallow, offerings should be something that can be worked at a slow to moderate retrieve without getting hung up on the bottom. I've had good luck using floating Mirolure plugs that descend only about a foot when retrieved and small lightweight bucktails. When fly-fishing, I've found that chartreuse, white or pink flies that suspend well will work most of the time.

So what's biting out there on the Delmarva flats you ask? Well, except for the structure fish such as tautog, sea bass and sheepshead, just about any other fish you'd normally expect to find in the back bays can and will, at times, end up in the shallow water. This summer we've had great luck hooking rockfish, redfish (puppy drum), bluefish, and even flounder in 1 to 3-feet of water, not to mention a few needlefish, rays, and believe it or not, one evening I caught a six-inch grouper! I told you the fishing reminded me of Florida!





Serve with cauliflower and lemon wedges.

4 bluefish fillets

1 cup light cream

1 tsp. dry sherry

1/8 tsp. pepper

1/8 tsp. red pepper

1/2 cup mushrooms, chopped

Steam the bluefish by placing a little water in a large frying pan.

Add a buttered cake rack.

Bring water to a boil, place the fillets on the rack, cover and steam until the fish flakes.

Remove to a heated platter and place in oven until the sauce is ready.

In a small saucepan, melt the butter and blend in the flour.

Add cream slowly, blending well.





1 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper

4 bay leaves

2 lbs. large shrimp, in their shells

1/2 lb. unsalted butter

4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

2 tsp. lemon juice

In large pot, combine water and next 5 ingredients and 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper.

Add bay leaves; cover and bring to a boil.

3 lbs. red drum fillets, skin on but scaled

1 TBSP. garlic, minced

1/2 tsp. black pepper

4 TBSP. unsalted butter

2 TBSP. Worcestershire sauce

2 TBSP. spicy cajun seasoning

3 garlic cloves, minced

2 TBSP. onions, minced

2 TBSP. green bell pepper, minced

2 TBSP. parsley, minced 12 oz. beer

Set a medium fire on grill. Rinse fillets and pat dry.

Sprinkle cut sides with garlic and pepper, pressing them gently onto fillets.

In a small saucepan, melt the butter over medium heat.

Add 1 TBSP. Worcestershire sauce, cajun seasoning, garlic, onion, green pepper parsley; stir well.

Saute until onion translucent and sauce has darkened and has slightly thickened. DO NOT BURN GARLIC.

Add beer, 1 TBSP. Worcestershire sauce and simmer 15 minutes on mediumhigh heat.

Lay fillets on oiled aluminum foil on grill grate.

Cook 20 minutes over lowmedium heat, raising lid only to baste generously.

Virginia Fishing Report

- by Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A. Representative



Anglers continue to experience fantastic fall saltwater fishing patterns on all fronts. The cooler water species will gain momentum as the temperatures drop, but for now, most of the commotion is the result of the departing summer species.

Inshore, cobia are still the biggest attraction, providing exceptional prospects lately. sightcasters Huge schools of fish are cruising along the surface as they group up to exit the area. Live eels, croaker, spot or bunker make great live bait for cobia, but these fish can be quite finicky as anglers barrage these schools with offerings. Several fish are exceeding 50pounds right now.

Big red drum continue to delight anglers as schools continue to swarm on lower Bay shoals and near the mouth of the Bay, where several reds were hooked near the 3rd and 4th Islands recently. Surfcasters are on alert, with the drum bite in the surf along Fisherman's Island on the rise. Look for big bulls to also show in the surf off Sandbridge and near the Little Island Fishing Pier soon.

Nice Spanish mackerel are still chasing trolled spoons along Sandbridge and Cape Henry in about 20 feet of water. The predominantly easterly winds have ushered in clear water close to shore, jump-starting the mackerel bite off the beach. Several kings up to around 30pounds were hooked on the troll over the past week. Inshore trollers are also encountering red drum, cobia, some big sharks and even

some jack crevelle and bailer mahi.

Sheepshead are still around for another month, along with lots of big hungry triggerfish, with the best action happening over the tubes of the CBBT. Tautog are also lurking in these same areas. Tog will be back in business starting on the 20th of the month.

Flounder are still rocking lower Bay waters as they continue to gather at the mouth of the Bay. Anglers working the 2nd and 3rd Islands of the CBBT and the Small Boat Channel thrilled with catches of nice flatfish averaging to over 5pounds lately. The Thimble Shoal and Baltimore Channels are also good places for drifters. Boats trying out the Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets are experiencing good luck, with scattered catches of 21 to 22-inchers. Offshore wreck action is also heating up. Captain Neal Taylor, skipper of the 'Seaduction' out of Lynnhaven, racked up a nice catch of wreck flatties up to 24-inches, along with some jumbo sea bass pushing to 4pounds near the Triangle wrecks last week.


Escalating speckled trout catches are beginning to draw more interest. If you can sneak your offerings past hoards of hungry puppy drum, good numbers of specks are still biting in most of the usual haunts such as Hungar's Creek, the Poquoson Flats and Mobjack Bay. Lynnhaven, Rudee and Little Creek Inlets, along with the Elizabeth River, are also giving up good numbers of fish, with some trout weighing in at over 5-pounds.

Spot are still making a good showing all over the southern and western sections of the lower Bay. Although the action slowed up a little last week, the upcoming coldfront could kick it up a notch over the weekend. Folks at The Fishing Center report that anglers are finding some yellowbellies in the Rudee and Lynnhaven Inlets, the lower Bay Rivers, near the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, Ocean View and along the Virginia Beach oceanfront. Medium and large croaker are lurking deeper areas channels, inlets, the Bridge Tunnel, the Monitor-Merrimac Memorial Bridge-Tunnel and the Concrete Ships off Kiptopeke.

Amberjack are still active local wrecks, on Chesapeake Light Tower and the Southern Towers through October, with jack crevelle also a possibility. Deep droppers are having good luck near the Canyon edges with limits of nice blueline tilefish and jumbo sea bass. Blackbellied rosefish, grouper barrelfish are also adding to the deepwater variety.

In keeping with excellent fall billfish trends we have experienced in recent years, white marlin are once again the main event offshore. The most recent upswing in billfish activity, with schools of white marlin swarming around bait balls, is drawing some of the best to the deep. Boats are flying dozens of white marlin flags. While a few boats are capitalizing on a method of releasing billfish via casting into bait balls, good numbers of billfish are also responding to traditional trolling methods. Scattered bigeye tuna are still blasting spreads in the Canyons, while yellowfin tuna are also still a possibility, along with some wahoo and mako sharks. Bailer-sized mahi everywhere, with big gaffers more common last week.



Local CCA Chapter spearheading Reef Star project

The Maryland Atlantic Coast Chapter of the Coastal Conservation Association, led by President Frank Watkins, is spearheading an effort to drop purchase the necessary rebar and biodegradeable mold lubricant, but are looking to obtain an additional grant and/or contributions to pay for the materials. There is also a need for a company to donate a flatbed truck or trailer to transport the Reef Stars from the Harkins concrete plant in Pittsville, MD to a storage area in West Ocean City and eventually to the Ocean City Reef Foundation barge in the



clusters of 12 "Reef Stars" within 10 miles of the Ocean City coastline.

To get the project going, Watkins obtained a grant from the Choptank Electric Trust to build the mold needed to create the Reef Star. Harkins Concrete, located in Salisbury, MD, agreed to fill the molds for free with excess concrete, reinforcing the Reef Star with rebar for additional strength.

The CCA has agreed to

Commercial Harbor before they are ultimately dropped into the Atlantic.

Contributions are also being sought to be used to purchase concrete from Harkins Concrete to accelerate the project. About 1.25 yards of concrete is needed to build each Reef Star. Both the CCA and the Ocean City Reef Foundation are 501C-3 tax exempt organizations, making donations tax deductible.



not a once and done project." said Watkins. "The waters off the Maryland coast have very little natural reefs within 10 miles of the coast. Building these large, long lasting, environmentally friendly artificial reefs will greatly improve marine and fish

habitat near Ocean City. This is a win-win project that is good for marine habitat and good for local, recreational fishermen."


